7.1.1 Practising Member  Professional members who are not in either the retired member category, the life member category, the provisional member category, or are otherwise subject to conditions of practice based on dues relief, are practising members and hold all the responsibilities, rights and privileges conferred on a professional engineer or a professional geoscientist, as the case may be, by the Act and these by-laws.	7.1.1 Practising Member  Professional members who are not in the retired member category, the life membership category, the provisional member category, or are otherwise subject to conditions of practice based on dues relief, are practising members and hold all the responsibilities, rights and privileges conferred on a professional engineer or a professional geoscientist, as the case may be, by the Act and these by-laws.	
7.1.2 Retired Member  Professional members who enter the retired member category shall not be practicing professional engineering or professional geoscience and shall not at that time intend to return to the practice.  They shall hold all the responsibilities and rights and privileges conferred on a professional engineer or a professional geoscientist by the Act and these by-laws, excepting the right to practice professional engineering or professional geoscience, and they:	7.1.2 Retired Member  Professional members who enter the retired member category shall not be practising professional engineering or professional geoscience. They will not be required to record and report professional development activity as prescribed by the association's Continuing Professional Development Program. Professional members in the retired member category shall confirm annually at the time of the payment of their annual dues that they have not been and will not be practicing professional engineering or professional geoscience as the case may be.

## 7.1.2.1 Life Membership

Life membership may, upon application, be granted to any practising member or retired member who:

- a) is at least 70 years of age; and
- b) has been a member of the association, or one of the constituent associations of the Canadian Council of Professional Engineers, for 30 years, or in the case of a professional geoscientist, has practised or been a member of the Association for a combined total of 30 years; and
- c) has retired from all gainful employment.

Once life membership is granted he or she shall, without further payment of dues, hold the same responsibilities and rights and privileges of members in the retired <u>practise</u> professional engineering or professional geoscience.

They will not be issued a validation sticker for their certificate of registration as provided for under these by-laws; and are required to surrender all seals issued in accordance with Part 8 of the Act.

Professional members in the retired member category shall confirm annually at the time of the payment of their annual dues that they have not been and will not be <u>practising</u> professional engineering or professional geoscience as the case may be.

Where a retired member wishes to be reinstated as a Practising Member, he or she shall notify the Registrar of their intention to do so and shall comply with the requirements outlined in the Continuing Professional Development Program.

## 7.1.3 Life Membership

Life membership may, upon application, be granted to any practising member or retired member who:

- a) is at least 70 years of age; and
- b) has been a member of the association, or one of the constituent associations of the Canadian Council of Professional Engineers, for 30 years, or in the case of a professional geoscientist, has been in a

from peers (in the form of the CCC) if they are in the Retired Member category for more than a given period of time. This provides assurance that no member will immediately start practising again if they've not been doing so for a prolonged period of time.

Since Retired Members are not practising, there is no requirement for them to perform continuing professional development.

7.1.3 Honorary Life Member  Honorary life membership, may be granted by unanimous decision of council to a professional member who has, in the opinion of council, rendered meritorious service to the association, or the profession, and who has preferably been a registered professional member for not less than 35 years. Professional members in the honorary life membership category shall pay no annual dues and hold all the rights and privileges conferred on a professional engineer or a professional geoscientist by the Act and these by-laws.	7.1.4 Honorary Life Member  Honorary life membership may be granted by unanimous decision of council to a professional member who has, in the opinion of council, rendered meritorious service to the association, or the profession, and who has preferably been a registered professional member for not less than 35 years. Professional members in this category whose practice has been interrupted for more than 48 months as a result of the circumstances which gave rise to such deferral or reduction may be required to demonstrate that they have obtained a minimum number of months of acceptable professional engineering or professional geoscience work experience during the preceding eight years before returning to the practising member category.

was therefore changed to reflect this status; Members on Deferred Dues are not practising members.

New wording provides clarification that, due to the short period of time that members are expected to be in this category, Members on Deferred Dues are expected to continue to participate in continuing professional development activities. Like all members, if they are unable to do meet the targets of the Continuing Professional Development Guideline, they may apply for abatement or consider changing to the Retired Member category.

Applicants who have 48 months of qualifying work experience and who have satisfied all of the requirements for registration of the Manual of Admissions, other than for the 12 month required period of work experience in a Canadian environment, may be registered as a provisional member until such time as the full work experience requirement is satisfied and on the conditions that:

- (a) the provisional member does not use the suffix "P.Eng." or "P.Geo.", but may, at his or her option, continue to use EIT or GIT;
- (b) all work issued by the provisional member is sealed by a professional engineer or professional geoscientist, as the case may be;
- (c) the provisional member and his or her supervisor submit semi-annual work experience reports over the period of the provisional membership in accordance with the Manual of Admissions:
- (d) registration to full professional membership is subject to the provisions of the Manual of Admissions; and
- (e) if, at the end of 36 months of provisional membership, the person has not yet become registered as a professional member, the provisional membership converts to member—in-training status.

Applicants who have 48 months of qualifying work experience and who have satisfied all of the requirements for registration of the Manual of Admissions, other than for the 12 month required period of work experience in a Canadian environment, may be registered as a provisional member until such time as the full work experience requirement is satisfied and on the conditions that:

- (a) the provisional member does not use the suffix "P.Eng." or "P.Geo.", but may, at his or her option, continue to use EIT or GIT;
- (b) all work issued by the provisional member is sealed by a professional engineer or professional geoscientist, as the case may be;
- (c) the provisional member and his or her supervisor submit semi-annual work experience reports over the period of the provisional membership in accordance with the Manual of Admissions;
- (d) registration to full professional membership is subject to the provisions of the Manual of Admissions; and
- (e) if, at the end of 36 months of provisional membership, the person has not yet become registered as a professional member, the provisional membership converts to member—in-training status.

Dues are not Practising members. The numbered positioning of this by-law was therefore changed to reflect this status; Provisional Members are not practising members.

#### 7.2 Other

The council shall establish policies and procedures that define the responsibilities, rights and privileges of temporary licensees, specified scope of practice licensees, members-in-training and students.

## 7.3 Notice of Delivery Address

- **7.3.1** Each professional member shall advise the registrar of the address to which the Association is to direct all correspondence to the member.
- **7.3.2** Each professional member shall advise the registrar of any change in the address to which the Association is to direct all correspondence to the member, within 30 calendar days of the effective date of the change of address.
- **7.3.3** Each professional member shall provide the registrar with the name and address of any person designated to receive correspondence from the Association on the member's behalf, with respect to:
- (a) Complaints, charges and disciplinary matters involving the member;

## 7.4 Requirement to Respond

- 7.4.1 Where the Association makes a written request to a member for a response within a specified period, the member shall provide a written response within the specified time period and shall provide the information, explanation or records in the possession of or under the control of the member. A written request sent to the mailing address of the member, or the member's designate, appearing in the records of the Association shall be deemed to have been delivered three working days following the date of being sent by registered mail, and shall be deemed to have been received by the member.

T toquitorillo	Beginning with the 2004 membership year, members in the practising category shall be asked to make the following declaration at the time of the payment of the annual dues for the renewal of registration.  "I declare that I have, on an ongoing basis, acquired the knowledge, skills and level of awareness necessary to undertake the professional services that I currently provide, or intend to provide, to my employer and clients, and to fulfill my professional responsibilities to the public."  Any failure to so declare shall be recorded in the member's file.	The Continuing Professional Development Program, approved by the council on June 15, 2011, is hereby adopted as the Continuing Professional Development Program of the Association.  Except as detailed in the Continuing Professional Development Program, members in the practising, honorary life, temporary licensee, and deferred dues categories must, in addition to maintaining competency in their field of practice through continuing professional development as per the Code of Ethics, record and report professional development activity as prescribed by the association's Continuing Professional Development Program.	Clauses 12.1 j) and k) of the Act empower the Association to establish, maintain and monitor a CPD program. Professional development itself is mandatory for all practicing engineers and geoscientists, as stated in Canon 3.2 of the Code of Ethics. The current by-law wording does not satisfy the intent of the Act.  This new wording implements a new program by which members will report their CPD activities,

Abatement from the program may constitute a reduced minimum number of professional development hours or temporary exemption from the program but may also include restrictions on the member's right to practise.
