

Morning Keynote Speaker

Minister Steve Ashton



Steve Ashton was first elected to the Manitoba Legislature in 1981. He was re-elected in the general elections of 1986, 1988, 1990, 1995, 1999, 2003, 2007 and 2011.

He was appointed Minister of Highways and Government Services in October 1999

(later changed to Transportation and Government Services) and Minister responsible for The Gaming Control Act in July 2000. He was appointed Minister responsible for Emergency Measures in October 2001. In September 2002, Steve was appointed Minister of Conservation and in November 2003, he became the first appointed Minister of Water Stewardship, a department that is solely committed to water issues and is the only department committed to water in Canada. In September 2006, Steve was appointed Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs and Minister responsible for Emergency Measures. In October 2009, he was appointed as Minister of Infrastructure and Transportation, Minister Responsible for Emergency Measures and Minister Responsible for the Manitoba Lotteries Corporation.

Steve is a graduate of R.D. Parker Collegiate in Thompson. He received a B.A. (Hon.) in Political Studies at the University of Manitoba and a M.A. in Economics from Lakehead University.

Steve has lived in Thompson since 1967. His wife Hari Dimitrakopoulou-Ashton is a college instructor. He has two children, Niki, the Member of Parliament for Churchill, and Alexander, an instructor with the University College of the North in Thompson.



More than an Airport

As we move forward from the construction and opening of Winnipeg's new airport terminal, we would like to share our ideas on the future and in particular the concepts of Airport City and Aerotropolis. The concept of Aerotropolis, a term coined by Dr. John Kasarda, is described as "a new urban form placing airports in the center with cities growing around them, connecting workers, suppliers, executives, and goods to the global marketplace."

An Aerotropolis is the recognition of a city's airport as not only a gateway to the world but as an influential driver of economic growth to its surrounding areas. Airports are gateways; acting as distribution points for both passengers and cargo. But a city's development around its airport ensures that city's success as a gateway to the world. This presentation will outline WAA's role as an airport city and its efforts to promote the city of Winnipeg in its continued development as an Aerotropolis. Particular topics will also include WAA's success in the development of its real estate property and the construction of our community's new state of the art passenger terminal.

Management, Motivation & Phychology in the Workplace

Attracting, retaining and motivating employees are ongoing challenges across most industries and business sectors today. Bonuses, flex benefit packages, flex time and other staff incentives have been employed with varying success as carrots to increase performance. The problem is regardless of the carrot, it's the upfront work done with the employee that will have the most impact on motivation.

This session will focus on the fact that motivation is created through what occurs at the beginning of the managerial/ leadership task cycle not at the end. Carrots are more rewarding if the upfront work has been done. How is this done, what must managers do that creates a desire to learn, excel, take on new responsibilities and contribute to the success of the project, the team and to the organization? This session will explore best practices employed by managers that translate into employees giving their best. It takes 60% of an employee's effort to get a reasonable performance review. The other 40% is discretionary. Learn how to work with employees in a manner that they are willing to provide you with that discretionary effort.

create sustainable change.


Dr. Meltzer is a master trainer for the Clark Wilson 360° instruments and has for over 10


Presented By: Lindsay Melvin, M.Sc., P.Eng.






Presented By: Carol Thiessen, Employment Equity Specialist, Manitoba Hydro

Immigration to Manitoba

Manitoba is making tremendous strides in increasing our population through immigration. Accounting for 77 per cent of all our newcomers in 2011, the Manitoba Provincial Nominee Program (MPNP) continued to be our largest source of labour market-destined immigrants. The MPNP helped immigration grow to 15,962 arrivals in 2011 from 3,725 in 1999. This represented the most immigrants received in a single year since the start of modern record keeping in 1946.

With our partners, Manitoba continues to provide high-quality immigration services from selection to settlement. It includes resources and supports to help Manitoba-destined immigrants with prearrival settlement and career planning. After arrival, it includes orientation, referral services, English as an additional language services, and support with employment and social integration. One of our program goals is to increase labour market success for our internationally educated immigrants by helping them get their qualifications recognized so they can work in their fields sooner. To this end, Manitoba has implemented new tools to assist immigrants begin their settlement planning prior to arriving, enacted The Fair Registration Practices in Regulated Professions Act and funded bridging programs such as the successful IEEQ Program for internationally educated engineers.

Manitoba recognizes that immigration is critical to building a strong and vibrant economy and helps our communities grow and prosper. Our overall goal is to advance our economy and our multicultural society by promoting our province as an immigration destination for skilled workers who meet local labour market needs, and by helping immigrants settle successfully in our province.

Ben Rempel is the Assistant Deputy Minister of Manitoba Immigration and Multiculturalism with lead responsibility for Manitoba's "Growing Through Immigration Strategy". He has

held the position since 2007.

The Department manages an integrated continuum of program and service delivery from the promotion & recruitment of skilled workers & entrepreneurs, immigrant selection through the Manitoba Provincial Nominee Program, preand post-arrival economic integration supports through Manitoba START, coordination and support for a broad range of adult language training and integration services, and supports for the improved recognition of international qualifications through legislation and client navigation supports. The "Growing Through Immigration Strategy" has achieved record labour market growth in Manitoba, attracted investment in diverse new business ventures, and supported the successful integration of immigrant newcomers from all categories.

Mr. Rempel has an Interdisciplinary Masters Degree from the University of Manitoba with a specialization in international migration issues.

Lisa is the President of RGI International, Inc. with offices in Winnipeg, MB and Rochester, NY. She has 19 years experience teaching business and technical communication courses for



Do Engineers 'Rule the World'? Should They?

Every professional has an obligation to practice his or her profession competently, with due care, and in the public interest. What's special about "Engineering ethics"? Engineers exercise a high degree of control over the technologies on which modern society depends. Does this special power carry with it special moral responsibilities?



Presented By: Arthur Schafer

Professor Schafer is Director of the Centre for Professional and Applied Ethics, at the University of Manitoba. He is also a Full Professor in the Department of Philosophy and an Ethics Consultant for the Winnipeg

Regional Health Authority, Department of Child Health. For ten years he was Head of the Section of Bio-Medical Ethics in the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Manitoba. He has also served as Visiting Scholar Green College, Oxford.

Professor Schafer has received a number of awards and honours. He is a Canadian Commonwealth Scholar, Honorary Woodrow Wilson Scholar, a Canada Council Fellow. At the University of Manitoba he has received the Stanton Teaching Excellence Award, the Campbell Award for University Outreach, and the University Teaching Service Award for Teaching Excellence.

Arthur Schafer has published widely in the fields of moral, social, and political philosophy. He is author of The Buck Stops Here: Reflections on moral responsibility, democratic accountability and military values, and co-editor of Ethics and Animal Experimentation. His curriculum vitae lists more than 90 scholarly articles and book chapters, covering a wide range of topics, with a special focus on issues in professional and bio-medical ethics, business and environmental ethics. Professor Schafer is National Research Associate of the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives, which has published two of his Reports. He has made several hundred conference presentations in Canada and abroad, and has written dozens of newspaper articles for The Globe and Mail, The Toronto Star, The Winnipeg Free Press, The Medical Post, and The Sunday Times (London).

Arthur Schafer has been a frequent guest on CBC radio and television, including many appearances on CBC radio's Morningside, This Morning and The Current, As It Happens, Sunday Morning, and Cross Country Check Up; and CBC television's The National, The Journal, The National Magazine, and Newsworld. He has also appeared frequently on The Discovery Network's "@Discovery.ca", discussing ethical and value aspects of medicine, science and technology; and on the CTV, WTN, Global and Baton television networks.

GLACIER Aerotest Thompson Facility

The Global Aerospace Centre for Icing and Environmental Research (GLACIER) in Thompson, Manitoba was designed and built by MDS. It is a joint venture between Rolls-Royce and Pratt & Whitney, two of the world's largest aerospace engine manufacturers. GLACIER provides the world's aerospace industry with rugged, true-to-life and rigorous testing in adverse environmental conditions, with measurement and capacity for today's gas turbine engines and those of the future.

The newly opened state-of-the-art GLACIER facility is designed to test the complete range of existing and future aircraft gas turbines. The centre also houses facilities for indoor proparation of engine packages, full engine measurement and control. GLACIER's data acquisition system can measure over 2,000 separate parameters at varying frequencies from steady state to dynamic characteristics.





Chris has over twenty years of experience in the aerospace and gas turbine engine testing environment.

He graduated from Queen's University as a Mechanical
